













BENNINGTON, VERMONT SEPTEMBER 21, 1971 8:00 P.M.

"Help! Save me! The others are all dead!" screamed a voice from the overturned school bus loaded with forty Hoosac students and three faculty members. Quickly responding lifesavers from the Bennington area rescue squads gave emergency first-aid and then conveyed the dead and injured to Putnam Memorial Hospital where the victims were processed. Two hours later Operation Disaster, a simulated disaster to test the skills and facilities of Putnam Memorial and local rescue squads, was over. The practice drill was organized by Bob Stout's father, Mr. Robert Stout, administrator of the Putnam Memorial Hospital.




