

Bishop Coadjutor in 1955.

Became Diocesan in 1950, upon the retirement of Bishop Oldham.

Received degrees from Nashotah Seminary and Hobart College (D.D.)

Received S.T.B. from General Theological Seminary.

Received LL.D. from St. Lawrence University in 1955.

Bishop Barry was a Trustee of General Theological Seminary
President of the Synod of the Second Province
Member of the National Council

Bishop Barry was appointed by Presiding Bishop Sherrill to membership on a Joint Nominating Committee for a new Presiding Bishop of the National Church, to be elected at General Convention—1958.

Died October 5, 1960.

then, Coach has been instrumental in starting tennis, cross-country, track, and hockey at Hoosac. Under his leadership a track has been built and a second soccer field has taken shape. Along with this, Coach is largely responsible for the neat appearance of the grounds and the cleanliness of the buildings. Coach's presence at Hoosac has made her a happier and a more smoothly running community in which to live.

The success which Coach has known in athletics, here at Hoosac, is indeed but one manifestation of the influence that his unique personality has had on all those who have come into contact with him—not only in athletics but in all phases of school life. In Coach is a warm, knowing, and understanding friend to whom all, both students and faculty, can turn with a problem. In approaching a problem with his wry sense of humor, yet with real concern, Coach can almost always be relied upon to provide a solution.

In attempt to show our appreciation and love of all he has done for us and for Hoosac, we, the class of 1961 dedicate the 1961 OWL to Harry Hodgeson Dickie.


Bill has done well here as we are sure he will do in years to come.




Pete Decker came to Hoosac three years ago. Since that time he has entered many activities both in athletics and extracurricular events.


Pete's fine record in academic work speaks for itself, for he appears almost constantly on the honor roll.




"Lights out!"


KEMPTON HICKS


This year he was soccer manager and assistant manager of the basketball team. He did a fine job as manager on these teams and certainly was an asset to the team.

We wish Lee the best of suntanned and scholarly futures.




JOHN PHILIP JACOBITTI






Peter Lorraine, a native of New York City, has been at Hoosac for four years. He has been connected with many activities during this time and has always done a commendable job.


In his spare time, a rarity at Hoosac, Dick often takes bow in hand and heads for the 500 acres where he gets in a bit of Archery practice.





With his fine personality we know that Ted will go a long way and we wish him Godspeed.




EDWARD JOHN OTTONE




Among the extracurricular activities Art participates in the Photography Club. He is also a member of the French Club.



In sports, Jay has participated in the Riding Club and the Outing Club. He was also a manager for both the Junior-Varsity basketball team and the track squad.






Antonians


The Boar's Head is followed by the Plum Pudding, Fruit, Hard Sauce, and the Elizabethans.
